Plenary Presentations:

- Panel: Overview of Guam's Response to Sexual Assault and Family Violence This panel will give the opportunity for agencies and organizations that respond to sexual assault and family violence. Agencies and organizations will have to opportunity to share three priority areas their organization needs to address to have an impact on ending family violence on Guam.
- Panel: Enhancing the Continuum of Care This panel will address domestic violence across the lifespan and will give agencies and organizations an opportunity to share their services, discuss the use of hotlines at their agency/organization to include victims response and response to others. The panel will have a chance to engage with the audience during a question and answer session.

Tracks:

Track A: Systems Advocacy

- **Best Practices for Law Enforcement-Evidence Based Prosecution**—The basis behind this session is to learn to investigate all Domestic Violence cases as you would a homicide case; learn to gather the evidence as if the victim is unable to participate in the legal process. This training is appropriate for law enforcement, prosecutors, advocates, and anyone who has a vested interest in the domestic violence process as we all have to learn to work together to get a desired outcome.
- **Bystander Intervention** This training is designed to empower participants to intervene safely and effectively step up and step in. It aims to promote a culture in which bystander intervention is widely accepted, expected, implemented and supported.

Track B: Trauma-Informed Care (TIC)

- Introduction to TIC; Historical Trauma and Oppression This session will define the trauma-informed care change of paradigm and highlight the "survivor-centered" philosophy/framework; demonstrate the practical application to organizational policies and procedures, services, and individual opportunities for reflection and growth; understand the impact of historical and generational aspect of trauma; learn to create compassion for intersections of oppression and privilege in our work.
- **Elements of TIC** This session will introduce the main areas of trauma-informed care; discuss the elements and the organizational response to vicarious trauma and building resiliency.

Track C: Victim Services

• **Peer2Peer: Nothing About us Without Us Part 1 & 2** – The focus of this session is the empowerment of self-advocates. Self-advocate engagement is a vital component of addressing violence against people with disabilities. This interactive session will explore the role of self-advocates in prevention efforts and healing from violence. Participants will gain an understanding of the rights of people with disabilities especially as it relates to relationships and healing from violence.

Track D: Community Awareness

- **Stop Abuse for Everybody** This session provides information on what being 'safe' means. Discussion includes the rights of persons with disabilities to be 'safe', the power and control wheel, types of abuse, identifying forms of abuse, how to assist, how to report, safety planning, and community resources.
- **Maximize Privacy & Safety 10 Easy Steps –** This session aims to give awareness on the dangers of social media and then provide peace of mind with steps to follow to ensure maximum security and privacy.
- **Technology, Advocacy, and Safety** The basis of this session is to show the audience the types of technology that is available and is being used by offenders in order to stalk, cyber-stalk, and offend victims and survivors of Domestic Violence.

Plenary Presentations:

- Ordinary or Outstanding? A Motivational Journey for Human Services Professionals This session focuses on compassion fatigue and provides tools to stay positive, and includes self-care, personal renewal, compassion satisfaction, and creativity. Participants will understand ways to be empathetic without taking on the problems and develop a plan for self-renewal.
- **Trauma-Informed Care in Practice** This session will focuses on the organizational response to various trauma & building staff resiliency; understanding and managing transition vs. change; creating safe and welcoming space; and trauma-informed supervision.
- **Financial Exploitation and Technology** Participants will learn how all forms of technology are being used to financially exploit the elderly and every other generation along the way. By learning and identifying the methods in which the offenders are using, you will become more aware of the dangers associated with technology.

Tracks:

Track A: Systems Advocacy

- Working with Perpetrators of Intimate Partner Violence This session will examine domestic violence though the lens of the abuser. An overview of partner abuse intervention programming and lessons learned from the field will be highlighted.
 Strategies for working with perpetrators of domestic violence that promote abuse accountability and victim safety will be the focus of this session.
- Responding to Crimes Against People with Disabilities Part 1 & 2 This session will examine model protocols for law
 enforcement and prosecutors for responding to violence against people with disabilities. Participants will learn
 techniques/strategies for improving response.

Track B: Trauma-Informed Care (TIC)

- **Trauma Informed Domestic Violence Services** –This session will give us an understanding of what happens to survivors when their coping mechanisms are overwhelmed by looking at principles that attend to their physical and emotional safety, drawing on their survivor defined approach, and relationship and connection to help through their trauma.
- *In Her Shoes* An interactive workshop designed to utilize various vignettes to inspire meaningful conversations from a trauma informed care perspective.
- **Financial Empowerment** This presentation will cover the approach to poverty reduction that focuses on improving the financial security of low-income victims/survivors and providing them with access to the information and tools that contribute to good financial decisions.

Track C: Victim Services

- **Protective Factors** In this session, participants will focus on promoting Protective Factors, rather than an approach that focuses on reducing risk factors, which may encourage parents to feel more comfortable seeking out extra support, help service providers develop positive relationships with families, and help families build and draw on natural support networks with their family and community.
- **LGBT Sensitivity** This presentation will assist participants in understanding the difference between sexual orientation and gender identity; developing a more accepting, welcoming, non-hostile environment for LGBT clients; and applying cultural competency skills towards LGBT survivors of sexual assault and domestic violence.
- **Cultural Sensitivity** This session focuses on informed and guiding service providers in being culturally and linguistically sensitive to their patients and clients. This is performed to help improve client services and to reduce and eliminate health and wellness disparities in the community.

Track D: Community Awareness

- 6 Tactics to Keep You Safe Online Learn about the 6 practical things you can do right now to ensure your activities online and on mobile are private and safe.
- **A Tour of Facebook's Privacy & Security Settings** This session will go over the privacy and security settings that Facebook provides, with the aim of making your Facebook account and profile as private and secure as possible.
- **Technology, Advocacy, and Safety** The basis of this session is to show the audience the types of technology that is available and is being used by offenders in order to stalk, cyber-stalk, and offend victims and survivors of Domestic Violence.
