**Bonnie Brandl** is the founder and Director of the National Clearinghouse on Abuse in Later Life, a project of End Domestic Abuse Wisconsin. Brandl is a recognized national leader within the elder abuse field and violence against women movement.

She has written national curricula for law enforcement, prosecutors, and victim service providers on elder abuse and facilitated trainings for thousands of professionals throughout the United States.

**Taunuu Ve'e** is currently doing contract work on a national level both in continental U.S. and the U.S. affiliated Pacific Island (USAPI) jurisdiction - American Samoa, Guam, CNMI, FSM, Republic of Marshall Islands, Republic of Palau.

She also provided liaison capacity with other API communities to formulate policy priorities, and develop strategies to advance those priorities, through federal and state legislative and administrative advocacy, coalition building, and media advocacy on issues related to Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders on the national and state level, as well as the USAPI jurisdiction.
